SUBJECT: Resolution No. 2023-01, Establishing Rates for Services for FY 2023-24

ISSUE

Should the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments (COG) Board of Directors adopt the attached resolution establishing rates for fee-for-service programs FY 2023-24?

BACKGROUND

The COG, as an intergovernmental entity formed by agreement pursuant to ORS Chapter 190, has the authority to enter into intergovernmental agreements for the delivery of services to its member governments. The COG presently offers a host of fee-for-service programs on a contractual basis with its member governments, including but not limited to: land use planning, housing rehabilitation loan administration, revolving loan program administration, legal services, executive recruiting, and other technical services.

As part of the budget setting process, the Board adopts a rate schedule annually that sets out the fees that the COG charges for services provided to member and non-member governments.

RECOMMENDATION

The Board adopt Resolution No. 2023-01 establishing rates for fee-for-service programs FY 2023-24.

DISCUSSION

The following discussion summarizes the analysis that staff used to arrive at the rates on the attached resolution to include:

- Any relevant historical context for the program or service and its associated rates;
- The assumptions and methodology staff used to arrive at the recommended rate;
- Where applicable, how the recommended rate compares with private sector rates for similar work; and
- Whether the proposed rate will generate revenue in excess of expenses, only recover costs, or result in a program loss (and if so, why that is advisable).

Any relevant historical context for the program or service and its associated rates;

Our costs for services are based upon the Seattle CPI-U of the previous December, which in this case is **6.3%**. Based upon this, a CPI adjustment of same for employees as well as an anticipated increase in benefit cost, we created a baseline for costs associated with Fees for Service. The Second part of our methodology was a review of the public and private market rates for similar services. This has been the historical context for review of service costs for our membership.

The categories of our rates for services, follow our categories of expertise at this time:

- 1. Member Services
 - a. Recruiting Services
 - b. Legal Services
 - c. Facilitation and Goal Setting Services
 - d. Convening
 - e. Administrative Support Services to include City Recorder, City Admin, Finance, and Budget
- 2. Community Development
 - a. Land Use Planning Services
 - b. Grant Writing Services
 - c. Grant Administration Services
 - d. Project Management Services
- 3. Transportation Planning
 - a. SKATS Staff and Professional Support
 - b. MWACT Staff and Professional Support
 - c. Transportation Modeling
 - d. Safe Routes to Schools
- 4. Economic Development Lending Services
 - a. Revolving Loan Funds
 - b. Banking Loan Services for VDI, which houses SBA, SBA 7a, ILP, IRP Loan Products
 - c. Housing Rehabilitation Loan Services
 - d. Capital Development Programs to include the Latino Business Alliance and Santiam Canyon Small Business Programs
- 5. Geographic Information Services and Data and Modeling Services
 - a. GIS Mapping Service
 - b. Data Mapping Services

- c. Census Mapping Services
- d. Data Center
- e. IT Application for Public Services
- f. Redistricting

Descriptions of Services Provided

Recruiting Services. The rates are well below that which recruiters charge (which based on recent recruitments in the area are \$20,000 - \$30,000 per recruitment). However, the services conducted by recruiters is markedly different, in that recruiters offer a guarantee and will also actively recruit candidates (whereas the COG's service approximates the role of an internal Human Resources staff - a passive recruitment model). The anticipated net effect of the attached rates is to be both revenue and cost neutral based on a five-year average.

<u>Legal Services</u>. The COG began providing legal services in 2018. The attached resolution contains two rates for attorney services. The first is for general counsel services. The second is for hearings officer services. Both rates are at or below what cities have historically paid for these services.

The COG will be changing its delivery of services based upon the retirement of the COG's General Counsel and the development of a new delivery of legal services as provided by internal COG staff. These services will focus on General Counsel and referral services and hearing officers services.

<u>Strategic Planning / Goal Setting</u>. The COG provides goal setting and strategic planning sessions with internal staff as facilitators. This is meant to be a fixed rate cost at or below market rates.

<u>Miscellaneous Services</u>. The COG will occasionally provide additional member services on a fee for service basis. For example, members will contract with the COG to facilitate amendments to the city Charter, facilitate resolution of conflicts, or perform other studies within the skills and abilities of the Executive Director. Because the demand for this type of work is intermittent, it is difficult to accurately predict the revenue impact of this rate, but any revenue would be minimal.

<u>Land Use Planning</u>. The COG provides land use planning services on a contractual, hourly basis for over twenty (21) jurisdictions throughout the region. The current contracts are set to expire on June 30, 2023.

Contract work includes current planning, special planning projects and long-range planning work, such as updating comprehensive plans, buildable land inventories and UGB expansions, code updates, mapping, etc. and this work is often shared between the local jurisdiction and private sector (if we are not successful in securing grant sources).

A market rate analysis of other planning services consultants within the region shows that, at the recommended rates, the COG proposed FY23/24in the mid-range of other planning consultants within the region.

Program attributes that sets the COG apart, in addition to our hourly services contracts, are:

- Direct representation of our local jurisdictions with an assigned planner they can become familiar with and develop firm relationships and understandings;
- Support from the Community Development program, including support from the Community Development Director, Housing Rehabilitation Specialist, Grant Administrator, Project Manager, and Small Business Loan Program staff; and
- Support from a total of seven (9) Community Development staff rather than a single land use planner providing office hours that can often serve as a siloed resource.

<u>Grants Administration.</u> COG staff also contract with cities and other local governments throughout the year for funding application assistance, administration of public infrastructure grants and loans, and/or income surveys or other tasks needed to ensure continued eligibility for various state and federal funding programs. The recommended rates will not achieve full cost recovery for this program area and may require additional funding to assist membership to include Administrative Fees in the Grants themselves or other sources such as EDA. Rates proposed are well within market rates for similar services.

<u>Housing Rehabilitation</u>. Community Development staff support the Valley Development Initiatives (VDI) housing rehabilitation program, manage the Marion County CDBG Housing Grant Program and contracted hourly services to support housing rehabilitation program contracts for the cities of Jefferson, Mt. Angel, Scotts Mills, Silverton, and Woodburn who maintain their own housing funds and desire COG assistance with program administration. The recommended rate will achieve full cost recovery for this program area.

Other Economic, Community and Project Development Services. Community Development staff will occasionally provide other economic development services, such as urban renewal planning, and other economic development efforts as requested by member local governments to enhance the region. The recommended rates for these services will achieve full cost recovery for those activities. It is anticipated that Staff will continue to support the MWVHousing Alliance and the North Santiam Sewer Authority as they develop into stand alone organizations.

GIS. The COG provides various technical GIS services to member governments to include:

- Updates of zoning and comprehensive plan maps as well as other maps needed for local land use planning services;
- Requested services of a local government, such as address mapping, or assistance with Census program participation (e.g. Boundary and Annexation Survey)

- Support to Yamhill County to maintain and update the county's online GIS web application;
- Services for the Salem-Keizer School District to maintain and update data layers, update and create maps of school boundaries, and maintain the district's online GIS web application (the Salem-Keizer School Finder), and other services requested by the district; and
- Mailing list GIS services for ODOT Region 2.

Modeling Services. On an infrequent basis (from two to four times per year), the COG transportation section will get requests for modeling forecasts from private sector companies (or their consultants) for projects associated with a private-sector land use development application. COG only provides this service only for the geographic area inside the SKATS MPO area. The proposed Transportation Modeling services hour charges of \$130/hour is higher than the "break-even" costs for the Region. In a typical year, the total amount of hours charge is less than 20 hours. Requests from our local governments within SKATS and ODOT for modeling forecasts and related outputs is not charged to those jurisdictions or ODOT since they provide local or state funds for matching the federal funds provided to the COG for SKATS.

Lending Services: The loan program bills the individual loan programs for the time spent to market, underwrite, funding and servicing the loans. The recommended staff rates are expected to achieve full cost recovery when loans are funded. However, because many prospective lending opportunities are not pursued by the business borrowers and their participating lenders, for a variety of reasons beyond the control of the loan program staff, the time spent working on these prospective projects is not billable, so the time and costs are not recovered in instances when a loan does not fund. The costs of those activities are then borne by the carryover in program income from year to year, which derives from other program revenues.

The loan program also receives a management contract with the Valley Development Initiative to manage their Programs which include SBA 504, 7a, ILP and IRP loan programs.

Legal Services

The Mid-Willamette Council of Government provides legal services and consulting to cities in Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties as well as to the COG offices and board of directors. Our attorneys have also worked as civic leaders and managers and have experience addressing the challenges communities face when obtaining, using, monitoring, or assessing legal services in local government settings. Legal services are available to city councils, managers, department directors and other supervisors to support a wide variety of municipal related legal issues.

Among the roles the MWVCOG General Counsel can provide to a community are: Flat Fee: Consultation and Navigation Services — Consultation with an attorney is the best means of preventing legal issues from arising. Whether the issue is the conduct of a public

meeting, the rights of individual citizens to access public records, employee issue, or the interpretation of a code or legal requirement, having familiar and reliable legal resources available to consult is crucial to the success of a local government recorder, administrator, and elected officials. COG attorneys are available to assist attorneys in assessing and thinking through legal issues in these types of matters. If more specialized or additional follow-up work is needed outside COG attorney area of practice, COG attorneys can assist the with finding appropriate counsel.

Hourly Fee:

Executive Contracts: Presently the MWVCOG provides services to advise city councils on the appropriate process to select and hire a city administrator. COG attorneys are available to assist with the preparation and negotiation of executive contracts for administrators and senior staff.

Code Drafting and Interpretation/Charter Review: COG attorneys are available to assist with drafting code amendments, interpreting local development codes and legal requirements, and drafting findings. COG attorneys can also assist with reviewing and drafting charter language.

Contracts and Agreements; COG attorneys are available to assist with negotiating, preparing, and ensuring compliance with a variety of agreements and contracts including; intergovernmental agreements, procurement contracts, and franchise agreements.

Hearings Officer — Communities have an opportunity to resolve code enforcement issues using hearings officer proceedings. Communities also have an opportunity to have local land use applications conducted by a hearings officer rather than by a locally appointed or elected body. The requirements resulting from Oregon's recent efforts to address middle housing deficiencies in communities has called for more streamlined procedures applying objective standards. In such cases, a hearings officer could more effective and consistent than a planning commission. Use of a hearings officer helps to eliminate appearance of political bias and can assure conduct of hearings emphasizing due process and fairness.

Mentor/Trainer – Mentoring and training packages to orient new city council members, mayors, planning commissioners, and key staff, including city managers new to Oregon, can be constructed or modified from materials used by the MWVCOG to conduct training in prior years on the topics of local governance 101, ethics, council-manager relations, employment agreements, system development charges, and other topics. Early education and training, as well as correction of misconceptions, can prepare a newly appointed or elected official to quickly be a fully functioning and effective member of an elected body operating within the confines of the laws that govern their role. The education and preparation can be accomplished during private conversations rather by "baptism by fire" in a public setting.

ISSUE

Does the Board wish to approve Resolution 2023-01 to authorize the Executive Director to apply for funds, enter into contracts and intergovernmental agreements (IGAs), and comply with other required federal filings with the Oregon Department of Transportation or the U.S. Department of Transportation to implement the 2023-24 Unified Planning Work Program for the Salem-Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS); and to authorized the Executive Director to enter into contracts and IGAs for other transportation-related activities in the MWVCOG area?

BACKGROUND

A Cooperative Agreement executed in 1987 and amended in 2003 by the members of SKATS (Marion and Polk Counties; the cities of Salem, Keizer, and Turner; the Salem Area Mass Transit District; the Salem-Keizer School District; and the Oregon Department of Transportation) states, "The Council of Governments shall retain the sole responsibility for acceptance of all contracts, grants and gifts for transportation planning in the Salem area, and all fiscal and financial responsibility therefore."

The SKATS Policy Committee is comprised of seven elected officials from the Salem-Keizer area and one ODOT representative. Every year, the Policy Committee adopts a Unified Planning Work Program, as required by federal law. There are times when it is to our advantage to enter into agreements with other agencies to share or access data in order to accomplish the work tasks identified in the UPWP. There are other times when the federal regulations require that we develop agreements with ODOT, the Transit District, or others regarding protocols or data assumptions. Most of the time these agreements have no financial payments associated with them, but some do (and must be consistent with the approved COG Budget).

The transportation planning and coordination activities of the Salem-Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS) are described, along with the funding sources for those activities, in the Unified Planning Work Program, which is developed annually by SKATS in conjunction with ODOT and U.S. DOT. The 2023-

24 Unified Planning Work Program is currently being reviewed and is scheduled for adoption by the SKATS Policy Committee in April 2023.

Approval of the recommended requested actions will secure the funding required for the activities outlined in the SKATS 2023-24 fiscal year Unified Planning Work Program.

The dollar amounts identified in this memorandum and in Resolution 2023-01 are estimates and may be modified as part of the final signed agreements.

RECOMMENDATION

That the following actions be taken to implement funding agreements with the Oregon Department of Transportation:

- 1. Authorize the Acting Executive Director or Executive Director to enter into the following agreements with the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) that provide federal and state funds to partially finance the SKATS Unified Planning Work Program:
 - a. Authorize approximately \$753,410.21 of FHWA "PL" Metropolitan Planning funds provided by the federal government through the FAST Act, plus \$86,231.17 ODOT matching funds.
 - b. Authorize approximately \$1,174,973.45 in federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds, with \$134,480.97 in required local matching funds.
 - c. Authorize approximately \$259,397.01 in FTA Section 5303 funds, with \$29,689.15 in required local matching funds supplied by the Salem Area Mass Transit District.
- 2. Authorize the Executive Director to execute a contract with the Salem Area Mass Transit District conveying approximately \$133,735 of federal and local match funds to conduct the Transit Planning within the SKATS transportation planning area.
- 3. Authorize the Executive Director to pursue other sources of funding as may be requested by the SKATS Policy Committee during the 2023-24 fiscal year.
- 4. Authorize the Executive Director to enter into contracts and Intergovernmental Agreements (IGA) with the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) and other public agencies as necessary to accomplish the work tasks identified in the 2023-24 Unified Planning Work Program for the Salem-Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS), as adopted by the SKATS Policy Committee.

Shall the COG Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into contracts with the interested parties/members listed below to aid in various community and economic development work throughout the region:

- 1. Land use planning services for local governments that express an interest in COG land use planning services on a contractual basis throughout the year. Currently, COG has existing agreements with 22 jurisdictions for hourly services that are set to expire on June 30, 2023. Other contract work may include current planning, special planning projects and long-range planning work, such as updating comprehensive plans.
- 2. The cities of Newberg, Independence, Yamhill County, and other local governments that request assistance with their small business loan funds.
- 3. Valley Development Initiatives (VDI) for administrative and staff support for SBA, SBA 7a, and other Rural Community Business Loan Programs; for Administrative Support for Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program; and for Loan Servicing and Closing Operations with Lane COG, CCD of Coos Bay, Oregon Cascades West COG and others for Operational and Loan Servicing Support.
- 4. Renewal of contracts for hourly services related to the housing rehabilitation program for the cities of Jefferson, Keizer, Mt. Angel, Silverton, and Woodburn who maintain their own funds and desire COG assistance with program administration.
- 5. Cities and other local governments that express an interest in COG services throughout the year for application assistance, administration of public infrastructure grants and loans, and/or income surveys or other tasks needed to ensure continued eligibility for various state and federal funding programs.

Contracts with member governments, not-for-profits, and/or other federal and state agencies associated with COVID-19 response; wildfire response; and/or American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds as opportunities arise and as requested by members to support community and economic response and recovery.

WHEREAS, all contracts for assistance may impose certain obligations upon the member governments, including adopted hourly rates or fixed fee service contracts; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors for the COG must authorize fixed fee-for-service contracts where the COG is the service provider:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MID-WILLAMETTE VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS:

- 1. That the Executive Director or Acting Executive Director is authorized to execute a grant agreement with the federal Economic Development Administration anticipated for \$75,000 to the COG to carry out the economic development district program, matched with \$75,000 in non-federal resources to support regional development activities such as identifying and prioritizing potential EDA public works investments in the region, the costs of preparing grant and loan applications for public infrastructure and other activities included in the economic development district work plan.
- 2. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute agreements for land use planning services with local governments that express an interest in COG land use planning services that substantially conform to the attached form of the agreement in Exhibit A.
- 3. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute contracts with the cities of Newberg, Independence, Yamhill County, and other local governments that request assistance with their small business loan funds in a form that substantially conforms to the attached form of agreement in Exhibit B.

- 4. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute an agreement with Valley Development Initiatives (VDI) for staff support to the rural community business loan program and for the housing rehabilitation loan program (Exhibit C).
- 5. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute renewal of contracts for hourly services related to the housing rehabilitation program for the cities of Jefferson, Mt. Angel, Scotts Mill, Silverton, and Woodburn who maintain their own funds and desire COG assistance with program administration (Exhibit D).
- 6. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute contracts with member governments for application assistance, grant and loan administration contracts, and/or income surveys or other tasks needed to ensure continued eligibility for various state and federal funding programs.
- 7. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute economic development services contracts, including contracts for urban renewal planning, and other economic development efforts as requested by member local governments to enhance the region.
- 8. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute contracts with member governments, not-for-profits, and/or other federal and state agencies associated with COVID-19 response and wildfire response, as opportunities arise and as requested by members to support community and economic response and recovery.
- 9. Fees for such services will be established by a separate Resolution of the Board.

CONTRACT

LAND USE PLANNING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 1st day of July, 2023 by and between the CITY OF ______, OREGON, a municipal corporation ("CITY"), and the MID-WILLAMETTE VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ("COG"), a voluntary intergovernmental association created by charter and Agreement pursuant to ORS Chapter 190 of which CITY is a member.

WITNESSETH:

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual premises and stipulations set out below, the CITY and COG do hereby agree as follows:

A. COG Responsibilities

- 1. COG shall provide an experienced land use planner to assist the CITY in processing land use actions, zone code revisions and other related activities which may be requested by the CITY.
- 2. COG shall provide to CITY mapping, graphics and document production services related to work requested by CITY under paragraph A.1.
- 3. COG shall provide to City legal services as requested by City related to work under paragraph A.1.
- 4. COG shall provide monthly billing statements.

B. CITY Responsibilities

- 1. CITY agrees to engage COG as a provider of land use planning consulting services.
- 2. CITY agrees to pay for land use planning services under paragraph A.1. at a rate of \$____ per hour for a land use planner, \$____ per hour for a GIS mapping analyst, \$__ per hour for legal services, and \$___ per hour for staff support assistance, plus mileage at the IRS mileage rate for travel related to providing said services.
- 3. CITY agrees to pay the actual cost of mapping, graphics and document production provided under paragraph A.2.
- 4. CITY shall review, process and pay COG's monthly invoices within 30 days of receipt.
- 5. CITY shall designate a key contact person through which all requests for services will come and with whom the activities of COG's land use planner will be coordinated.

C. COG Services Provided Without Additional Compensation

1. COG shall provide advice and assistance to CITY with grant and loan applications for financing of public improvements at no additional charge except in those instances when such work may be eligible for compensation from the granting agency.

- 2. COG shall prepare documentation and applications for funding for additional planning projects on behalf of CITY.
- 3. COG shall refer CITY to other available resources that may be available to address needs of CITY upon request.

D. Termination and Amendment

- 1. This Agreement shall be terminated on June 30, 2023, unless otherwise agreed to by COG and CITY by amendment to this Agreement.
- 2. This Agreement may be terminated for convenience by either party upon written notice of 30 calendar days.
- 3. This Agreement may be amended only by written agreement executed between the parties.

E. Independent Contract

1. The CITY has engaged COG as an independent contractor for the accomplishment of a particular service. Neither party, nor the officers and employees of either party shall be deemed the agents or employees of the other party for any purpose.

F. Limited Warranty

- 1. Unless requested by the City that the COG provide legal services, CITY agrees to seek and rely exclusively on the advice of its own legal counsel as to the legal sufficiency of the land use planning process and its products. The parties expressly recognize that the review process involves political and legal judgment entirely within the control and authority of the CITY. COG's only obligation is to provide advice from the perspective of land use planning principles, and not legal or political counsel.
- 2. In no event shall COG be liable for indirect or consequential damages of any nature. In no event, regardless of theory of recovery, shall COG be liable for any damages in excess of the amounts actually paid by CITY to COG under Paragraph B. hereof.
- 3. CITY agrees to provide a representative to present the CITY's viewpoint at public hearings regarding a dispute between the CITY and the County or another city. COG will provide support and information as appropriate (including research and staff reports) to aid the CITY in making its arguments.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 1st day of July. 2023 by and between Valley Development Initiatives, an Oregon non-profit corporation (hereinafter "VDI") and the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments. a voluntary intergovernmental association created by Agreement pursuant to ORS Chapter 190 (hereinafter "COG").

WITNESSETH:

THAT VDI desires to engage COG to render certain professional services hereinafter described that are related to the operation of a rural community loan program. The loans are made to eligible applicants in rural communities of Marion, Polk, Yamhill, and Clackamas Counties derived from funds provided to VDI as a loan through the Intermediary Relending Program of the Rural Development, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

1. Scope of Work to be Performed by COG

- A. Publicize the objectives and availability of the Intermediary Relending Program loans in eligible communities of the region, including special outreach efforts for minority and female-owned small businesses.
- B. Counsel loan applicants and help them prepare documentation needed for complete applications.
- C. Prepare a credit analysis of each loan application and make a recommendation to the Board of Directors.
- D. Prepare any additional documentation that may be required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (hereinafter "USDA") after a proposal is approved by VDI.
- E. Prepare an environmental analysis of each loan application as may be required by the USDA.
- F. Prepare closing documents and manage the loan closing process in a timely manner and in compliance with all appropriate regulations.
- G. Monitor repayments of loans, perform servicing and accounting functions, and provide counseling to borrowers with repayment difficulties.

- H. Perform loan collections and, with the advice of legal counsel when appropriate, initiate asset liquidation actions.
- Prepare monthly financial reports and other program performance reports as may be requested by VDI or the USDA. Prepare an annual budget for VDI in accordance with state and federal laws and regulations.
- J. Provide all necessary staff support to the Board of VDI such as making arrangements for meetings, preparing agendas, preparing correspondence for Board signature, preparing minutes of meetings for appropriate Board approval and implementing Board decisions and actions.

2. Compensation

A. For the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2023, the COG shall be due a fixed fee of \$____ for the work described in this Agreement payable in quarterly installments of \$____ as follows:

July 1, 2023 October 1, 2023 January 1, 2024 April 1, 2024

- B. In addition, the COG shall be due a loan-servicing fee of 0.25%, up to an annual maximum of \$_____, of the outstanding loan VDI balances, assessed quarterly on the above dates.
- C. The fee paid to the COG shall be proposed to the VDI Board of Directors on an annual basis. After the COG and the VDI Board of Directors agree to such compensation, its terms shall be submitted to the appropriate staff of the USDA for their approval. Under no circumstances shall such fees be paid from the USDA loans principal.
- D. In the event of unusual or protracted transactions such as major collection actions, the COG may be eligible for additional compensation. The COG shall present such additional compensation to the VDI Board of Directors and to the USDA on a case-by-case basis for review and approval prior to disbursal of any additional funds.

3. Miscellaneous Understandings

- A. COG is engaged as an independent contractor and shall be solely responsible for payment of contributions and benefits under FICA, Workers Compensation, and benefits programs such as may be offered by COG or required by law. COG shall likewise be solely responsible for the collection, accounting and payment of personal income taxes, property taxes and excise taxes, as may be applicable.
- B. VDI shall not have the right to control or interfere with the manner or method of COG's accomplishment of its services specified in this Agreement.
- C. COG and VDI agree that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, handicap, or age, suffer discrimination in the performance of this Agreement.

D. COG agrees to indemnify VDI from each and every claim which the COG would be legally liable to pay if: a) a claim asserting the same loss or injury were made directly against the COG, whether or not such a direct claim is actually made; and b) the loss or injury sustained by the claimant resulted from the acts, errors or omissions of the COG or those for whose actions the COG is legally responsible. "Indemnify", as used herein, means to indemnify, defend and same harmless. Notwithstanding the foregoing, COG shall have no such obligation to indemnify VD I with respect to any claim which arises from or in connection with VDI's use of COG's work product contrary to COG's express instruction or for other than its intended purpose, if such misuse is a substantial factor in causing the asserted loss or injury.

4. Termination

VDI Board of Directors

- A. This Agreement may be terminated by mutual consent of the parties. The USDA, however, must approve any subsequent agreement for services.
- B. The terms and conditions of the administrative fee shall be reconsidered on an annual basis and approved by the USDA.

ISSUE

Shall the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments (COG) Board of Directors authorize the Executive Director to enter into contracts with member governments to provide legal counsel services and other services as requested.

BACKGROUND

Historically, the COG has provided a variety of services for our members, including recruitment services, charter reviews, professional staff evaluations, and other administrative and financial services. Starting in 2018, the COG began offering legal services to its member governments. The recommended Board action would give the Executive Director the authority to enter into agreements to continue these services, or to respond to new requests.

RECOMMENDATION

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ATTORNEY SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this_day of_, 2023 by and between the CITY OF — — — OREGON, a municipal corporation ("CITY"), and the MID-WILLAMETTE VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ("COG"), a voluntary intergovernmental association created by charter and Agreement pursuant to ORS Chapter 190 of which CITY is a member.

WITNESSETH:

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual premises and stipulations set out below, the CITY and COG do hereby agree as follows:

A. COG Responsibilities

- 1. COG shall provide an experienced local government attorney, with active Oregon State Bar Association membership to provide general legal services to CITY. Services may include the following legal services:
 - a. Provide legal advice on day to day questions as posed by designated CITY representatives on an as needed basis, but not as designated as that city's city attorney. Services may be initiated or assigned by email contact with the attorney or as through formal action at a CITY meeting.
 - b. Review and drafting of contracts, intergovernmental agreements, and other documents and legal instruments as requested by CITY.
 - c. Drafting or resolutions, ordinances, and updates of municipal code sections as requested by CITY.
 - d. Attendance at CITY meetings as requested by CITY and coordinated with the designated attorney.
 - e. Attendance at meetings requiring legal representation either accompanying one or more CITY representatives or as the designated CITY legal representative.
 - f. Training of CITY personnel, elected, and appointed officials on legal issues.
 - g. Other legal services as requested by CITY, but not including acting as that city's city attorney or providing advice on matters as bond counsel, related to personnel and labor negotiations, city prosecutor, or other specialized attorney services beyond agreed upon general legal representation.
 - 2. COG shall provide CITY with written legal opinions, draft and finalize agreements, and draft resolutions and ordinances addressing CITY needs.
 - 3. COG shall maintain a list of active projects that the local government attorney is undertaking for CITY. The active project list shall be provided on a monthly basis to CITY if requested.
 - 4. COG shall provide monthly billing statements identifying legal costs by project.
 - 5. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute with any member government an agreement to provide other services to include recruitment services, charter reviews, professional staff evaluations, and other administrative and financial services to members.

B. <u>CITY Responsibilities</u>

- 1. CITY agrees to engage COG as a provider of local government legal or administrative services.
- 2. CITY agrees to pay for an annual flat fee for legal navigation and consultation services. Additionally, CITY agrees to pay for local government attorney services under paragraph Al according to the rate resolution approved by the COG board.
- 3. CITY shall review, process, and pay COG's monthly invoices within 30 days of receipt. CITY shall provide the name, email, and phone number of the CITY's billing contact.
- 4. CITY shall designate a key contact person through which all requests for services will come and with whom the activities of COG's local government attorney will be coordinated.

C. Work Product

- 1. Any work product created by the local government attorney pursuant to tasks performed on behalf of CITY shall constitute CITY work product.
- 2. COG will provide CITY with copies of all work products in electronic form. Printed copies of work product shall be provided upon written request.

D. Termination and Amendment

- 1. This Agreement shall be terminated on June 30, 2024, unless otherwise agreed to by COG and CITY by amendment to this Agreement.
- 2. This Agreement may be terminated for convenience by either party upon written notice of 30 calendar days.
- 3. This Agreement may be amended only by written agreement executed between the parties.

E. Non-Exclusive Representation

- 1. COG will provide local government attorney services as requested by CITY.
- 2. The parties agree that local government attorney services provided by COG shall be non-exclusive as CITY reserves the right to employ attorney staff or contract for legal services.
- 3. CITY shall be responsible for determining which legal tasks it assigns to the COG and to any other individual or firm.
- 4. If CITY has a staff attorney or contract attorney firm serving as the designated City Attorney, COG local government attorney assigned to perform CITY work will report to the CITY key contact person.

F. Independent Contract

The CITY has engaged COG as an independent contractor for the accomplishment of a particular service. Neither party, nor the officers and employees of either party, shall be deemed the agents or employees of the other party for any purpose.

G. <u>Limited Warranty</u>

- 1. COG's only obligation is to provide an experienced local government attorney, who is an employee or under contract with COG, to provide legal counsel on CITY requested projects.
- 2. In no event shall COG be liable for indirect or consequential damages of any nature. In no event, regardless of theory of recovery, shall COG be liable for any damages in excess of the amounts actually paid by CITY to COG under Paragraph B. hereof.

H. Conflicts

Should a conflict arise regarding billing or quality of service, the parties shall meet to attempt to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days of issue identification. Each party shall designate a representative authorized to negotiate a solution to the conflict. If the conflict cannot be resolved by the parties, the parties will submit the issue for mediation.

Financial Software Transition Update

At the September 2021 Board meeting the COG Board requested an update on the transition of financial systems from GMS software to QuickBooks. The transition of data is complete, and we have been able to cancel our subscription to the old GMS software. Most recently finance staff have been developing internal reports to assist managers in in managing contract and project budgets.

QuickBooks software has now been in place long enough to contain over a year's worth of financial information. We have been using the system to assist with the audit process for FY 2021-22, which at the time of this report being written is still underway. We have had feedback from the auditors that they appreciate being able to log in and test transactions directly.

Revenue and Expense

COG's activities related to the budget are shown in Attachment A, an un-audited COG wide Budget versus actuals report through January 31, 2023. At the end of January 59% of the budget year has elapsed. Overall expenses are at approximately 49.77% of budget.

The revenue(income) section of the report demonstrates that COG has received 55.62%. The original budget was amended with Supplemental Budget #1 to recognize \$2,150,000 in new revenues in December, and a second supplemental budget is anticipated in the before the end of the fiscal year to recognize all other new revenue. Not all funds received are spent in the fiscal year due to projects spanning fiscal years, so some revenue and expenses are carried over to the next fiscal year.

BudgetThe budget calendar for presenting the FY 2023-24 budget is listed as a separate item on the agenda for adoption along with appointment of the budget committee.

SUBJECT: Planning, Loan Program and EDD Programs Update

The following summary highlights new and continuing Community Development activities completed by COG staff over the past four (4) months:

Land Use Planning

Our planners continue to support communities through draft code amendments, zone and comprehensive plan map updates, and new overlay zones and design standards, in addition to a large number of new development and subdivision applications in the area.

COG currently provides contract planning services to 24 cities. Over the past 6+ months, COG staff has provided interim planning services to the cities of Monmouth, Dundee, McMinnville and will be beginning planning services for Newberg in the coming weeks. COG planners will also be assisting the following communities with submission of Planning Assistance (PA) funding applications to DLCD for continued long-range planning work, specifically directed at addressing needed housing in our region: Carlton, Detroit, Falls City, Hubbard Gates, and Mt. Angel.

Grant Administration We continue to assist Amity with their water improvements project, the City of Falls City with a \$493,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for future wastewater improvements project, the cities of Jefferson and Independence on Davis-Bacon and BOLI wage monitoring requirements related to a Oregon funded infrastructure projects, and the City of Willamina on their successful Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) award for \$873,912 to relocate their water intake and two (2) new supplemental CDBG and SPWF fund applications to help reduce any loan costs to the city.

Economic Development

We executed our contract for the Santiam Canyon Fire Recovery Septic Replacement Grant we received from DEQ in January of 2023. We have been working with Marion County to develop a joint application since Marion County also has funds allocated to assist property owners impacted by the fire. We launched our grant application on February 14, 2023 and already have **85 applicants** to the estimated 600 damaged or destroyed septic tanks in the Canyon. We are excited at how well this program has been received and partnerships with the Long Term Recovery Group are helping tremendously with our outreach to the community.

We have been successful in using our funds from the **Business Oregon** and the **Ford Family Foundation** for Grant Prospecting and writing. We hired additional staff in April 2022 and have successfully applied for several CDBG grants. We are also have over **15 contracts** with members to provide grant writing and administration services to assist in finding funding sources for our communities.

The Latino Business Alliance (LBA), based upon recommendations by SEDCOR, has engaged with COG to discuss our potential housing and staffing of a newly awarded Technical Assistance grant from Business Oregon. The majority of grant funds will be allocated toward the SBDC and SEDCOR to assess, develop, and conduct linguistically and culturally appropriate Latinx/a/o business development training and technical assistance curriculum developed; but a small grant allocation is dedicated toward COG's small business lending program to assist the LBA in development of a Latinx/a/o microenterprise loan fund for area businesses that COG has also been asked to provide loan servicing for. The Business Oregon TA grant was matched with \$100,000 the LBA has already set aside to start the microenterprise loan program. Oregon Economic Development Districts, in partnership with Link Oregon and The Ford Family Foundation (TFFF), are working to market and help with outreach to all populations within our region and service providers to ensure sufficient response rates on an upcoming statewide mapping initiative for accurate connectivity data.

COG staff are currently working with the University of Oregon staff to complete our 2023-2028 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Update. This document is used to guide applications for federal and state funding sources in a Regional Partnership view.

COG staff continues to track and "work" over 80 submitted projects through the Economic Development Administration (EDA) application process and to identify potential state and federal funding sources. RST and COG are coordinating informational sessions and webinars related to American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding requirements and opportunities to leverage ARPA funds with other programs. COG staff assisted SEDCOR, Willamette Workforce Partnership, and Chemeketa Community College with a new Good Jobs Challenge EDA grant application to support the creation of a "Willamette Valley Agriculture Innovation Consortium" built upon existing relationships with our regional workforce board and training partners. COG staff will also provide support to The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde on an EDA application for a Homeownership Development Complex proposed to create over 80 new residential lots for development by Tribal members.

COG continues to support **Marion County** and the **Santiam Canyon** communities with wildfire response and recovery, including supporting land use planning applications and code updates to respond to immediate fire recovery and rebuilding, and coordinating meetings and support related to SEDCOR's Construction Alliance project to build a new community center. Other milestones include:

- We completed over **90 Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA)** to correct the FEMA maps for any properties documented to not be within the floodway to further remove barriers to rebuilding/redevelopment. This was funded by a DLCD Planning Assistance (PA) grant and has been beneficial to property owners impacted by the 2020 wildfires.
- We are nearing completion of our full code audits and code adoptions for Detroit and Gates of a DLCD Technical Assistance (TA) grant. Staff kicked off the 18-month program work in February 2022.
- COG has begun project management services to the NSSA board for the second phase of sewer project. This involves the Mill City/Gates sewer upgrade and the initial assessment of the Detroit/Idhana testing sites. Our multi-year work on this project with Keller Associates has allowed us to provide continuity and stability to the Canyon Communities involved in this complex project.

Housing Rehabilitation

City of Silverton, in partnership with the cities of Hubbard and Stayton, recently received their award announcement for \$450,000 in CDBG-CV-2 (Coronavirus funding) funding to assist with rehabilitation of eligible structures in manufactured home parks. COG staff assisted have successfully administered this will provide grant administration from Business Oregon. COG staff is also assisting property owners with Valley Development Initiative (VDI) housing rehabilitation loans in Aumsville, Aurora, Silverton, Stayton, Turner, unincorporated Marion County and Santiam Canyon.

SUBJECT: Transportation and GIS Programs Update

Mid-Willamette Area Commission on Transportation (MWACT)

February 2. 2023 MWACT Meeting – MWACT was informed of the new representatives added to the committee: Yamhill County Commissioner Kit Johnston; Marion County Commissioner Kevin Cameron; Yamhill Mayor Yvette Potter, representing the 99W/18/47 Transportation Corridor; and Woodburn Mayor Frank Lonergan, representing the I-5 Corridor. The vacancy for the Highways 99E/213 Corridor will be filled at the next meeting with Silverton City Councilor April Newton.

Arla Miller, ODOT Region 2A Regional Transit Coordinator, announced that there are three applications for STIF/IC¹ Funds that are from within the MWACT Area. The three proposed projects are:

- $\sqrt{}$ The city of Monmouth requests funding for a Monmouth-Independence Trolley The purpose of this project is to provide reliable connections to shopping areas, the downtown areas for both Monmouth and Independence and the college along with connections to regional transit service.
- $\sqrt{}$ The Salem Area Mass Transit District is seeking funding for appropriately sized vehicles to service four local routes. The buses would initially serve as neighborhood circulators with the option of for micro transit in the future.
- √ Yamhill County Transit is seeking funding for replacement buses. Maintaining reliable buses is an ongoing issue for Yamhill County Transit. It is an important factor in providing transportation options to the community especially to vulnerable populations.

¹ STIF/IC Funds – Statewide Transportation Improvement Funds/Intercity Discretionary Funds.

The total amount of funding requested for the three projects is \$3.1 million. A total of \$28.5 million is available statewide. Ms. Miller encouraged MWACT members to provide comments to the ODOT project selection committee and the Public Transportation Advisory Committee.

Ms. Miller announced that ODOT is accepting applications for ODOT Innovative Mobility Program Micro-grants. Successful applications will receive up to \$5,000; examples of eligible projects are electric scooter shares, carpools and vanpools, bike locks and helmets, training and information among other innovative services that make it easier to walk, bike, roll, share rides, or take transit.

Salem Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS)

Cathy Clark and Lyle Mordhorst were re-elected as Chair and Vice Chair of the SKATS Policy Committee (PC), respectively, during the January 24, 2023 PC meeting.

Staff are completing work on the 20-year draft SKATS Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and the draft FY 2024-2029 SKATS Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which contains funding allocations for projects within the SKATS area. Both draft plans are being finalized to be released for public review and comment, most likely in early spring 2023. Adoption by the SKATS Policy Committee is scheduled for late May 2023.

Underfunded projects have become an ongoing issue due to the rapid escalation in the cost of construction materials, from increased fuel costs and inflation. Completion of projects is a high priority to the SKATS Policy Committee. Due to the significant number of projects that could experience funding shortfalls, it was determined not to fund new projects in the draft FY 2024-2029 TIP at this time. The SKATS Policy Committee unanimously adopted the following policy motion at their January meeting:

"Make completing projects in the TIP a priority over adding new projects to the TIP. Commit to adding funds to projects as they are requested and delaying projects and/or project phases if additional funds are needed as long as project sponsors have shown they have considered reasonable cost-reduction options and a commitment to timely project delivery before requesting additional funding."

Related to this policy, the Policy Committee approved additional federal transportation funds allocated to SKATS for completing two Marion County projects that were underfunded due to cost escalations:

- Hollywood Dr: Silverton Rd to Greenfield Ln Amount requested: **\$817,843** federal funds.
- Lancaster Dr: Center St to Monroe Ave Amount requested: \$650,741 federal funds.

Additional work in January, February and March 2023 included:

- Draft 2023-2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) The SKATS' committees
 reviewed the draft annual work program and provided feedback. Following review by
 federal and state agencies, the SKATS Policy Committee is likely to adopt the final
 UPWP in April 2023.
- SKATS 2022 Annual Listing of Federal Obligations Report This report documenting the federal transportation funds that were obligated within the SKATS area in 2022 was posted to the MWVCOG website. The report also contains a listing of projects that were completed during the year. Before and after illustrations/photos were included along with project descriptions and an overview of the benefits of the completed projects. It was noted that in 2022, 114 percent of federal funds programmed were actually obligated, which was well over the target of a 55 percent obligation rate for the year. As a result of the success in obligating federal funds, the MPO received \$1,620,304 in extra federal redistribution funds which will be applied to projects that are experiencing funding shortfalls.
- SKATS Metropolitan Transportation Safety Action Plan (TSAP) this is a new plan that is being developed by SKATS, to develop policies and actions to address safety concerns related to driving, walking, biking, and rolling in the Salem-Keizer area. The MTSAP will study the crash data, their causes, and examine locations that have the highest number of crashes. The MPO is involving experts in traffic engineering, enforcement, and planning to develop recommendations of solutions to reduce crashes. A virtual (online) open house is open from March 13th to April 3rd for the public to give their input on general safety concerns about the transportation system and use an online map to indicate roads they feel are a safety concern. A combination of 30,000 postcards to residents, newspaper ads and stories, and social media is being use to promote the online survey. Four focus groups of residents to discuss these safety concerns are scheduled in the second half of March.

Safe Routes to School Program (MWVCOG and Salem-Keizer School District)

Salem-Keizer Public Schools announced the adoption of pedestrian safety curriculum in PE classes starting school 2023-2024.

Activities this quarter included teaching pedestrian safety at Richmond, Englewood, Grant, and Washington Elementary Schools. Work on the development of walking maps for elementary schools within the Salem-Keizer Public School system with MWVCOG GIS staff continued.

The first Winter Walk + Roll to School event with Washington Elementary School occurred on February 8th, 2023. Salem Mayor Chris Hoy, Salem City Council member Jose Gonzalez, and Salem City Manager Keith Stahley attended the event. The event was successful, and families have asked to continue more walking buses to school.

Census and Geographic Information Systems (GIS)

In January 2023, the Environmental Justice Analyses for both the draft FY 2024-2029 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and draft 20-year, long-range Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) updates were completed.

GIS staff members completed the 2022 year-end building permit report and the semiannual street file update. The address geocoding project for Chemeketa Community College was also completed.

Aurora's Transportation Systems Plan (TSP) map was updated as was the city of Sheridan's zoning map. Updates were made to the Salem-Keizer School District online web application. Turner's street system map and web map applications were update.

Materials were submitted to the Census Bureau for the city of Sheridan's Boundary and Annexation Survey (BAS).

Online maps for both the SKATS draft F"Y 2024-2029 TIP and draft 2023-2050 MTP were created. These maps will be used as part of the public outreach for both plans that will begin in March 2023. The public can make their comments via the online maps.

Subject: December 31, 2022 Quarterly Financials for Business Lending Program

Please find attached to this cover memo, the unaudited financials for the RLF and VDI Loans, for December 31, 2022. These reports show current cash on hand for the Business Lending Program, Current outstanding Loan Balances, and Fiscal year to date Receivables from Loans. I apologized for the lateness in getting you this report.

COG Revolving Loan Fund:

As of December 2022, there are 16 Loans Outstanding with a value of \$2,475,762, a decrease of total outstanding loan value by \$464,084. During this period, a loan to Wizard Properties was paid off, lowering total number of RLF Loans from 17 to 16 loans. The yearly Revenue/Payments to the three RLF Loan Programs are estimated at \$227,506 which allows for up to 50% available for administrative cost in the estimated amount of \$113,753. The EDA Cares Act funding available for lending has been lent as of its end date of July 30, 2022 and has netted 5 loans with an outstanding loan value of \$1,255,730.44 and has resulted in an increase of lendable funds by \$331,098 as of 12.31.22. Available for future lending is an amount of \$1,565,210 as of 12.31.22. This has improved our overall loan value, which, as it is paid back, increases our loanable dollars for the program.

VDI Loans:

The VDI Loan Pool has five (5) funds with a total amount of Funds Available for Lending purposes of \$1,679,815 as of 12.31.2022. The SBA ILP Programs loan target amount has decreased with a loan to Pacific NW Hydro to comply with lending requirements in the Agreement by and with SBA. The Loan amount of \$106,250 will work to lower our exposed outstanding lending liability under terms with the agreement on receiving these funds and stuff is working towards lending out more from this fund. We anticipate a non-compliance note in our Audit regarding same. As you may recall in the FY 20-21 Audit

and prior Fiscal Reporting during the current FY Past, FY 21-22, A pre-payment of a Loan was repaid in the last month of the 20-21 Fiscal Year¹.

There are currently 16 Loans outstanding with a value of \$1,841,189. The yearly Revenue/Payments to the five VDI Loan Programs is \$212,064. The VDI obligations to the COG for Personnel Lending and Support Services is \$154,000 of which there are two of the five SBA programs that are charged against. Both are underperforming Funds with current Revenues of \$125,488. The \$28,512 shortfall is made up by current revenues to include 13,620 /year revenue from six (6) SBA 504 Loans and principal as well as interest from two older USDA programs and the SBA ILP program. Loan personnel are working to increase the amount of SBA Loan activity in order to increase the year over year cash flow thus decreasing the need to use loan repayment proceeds in order to balance the transfer cost noted above.

Current Pipeline Loan Work:

Lending staff is currently working on loan documentation and closing:

- Pacific Northwest Hydro, LLC VDI Equipment term loan for \$106,250. Expected closing date 12/1/2022. 50% funded in December 2022, with the remainder funded in Feb. 2023.
- Ochoa' Queseria LLC SBA 540 to close by 1/1/2023. **Closed in December 2022** Other opportunities in the discussion/application phase include:
 - Flipside LLC \$1,561,875 SBA 504 Loan amount now \$1,574,550 waiting commitment from Citizens Bank; if approved, COG expected loan closing 12/2023.
 - Turley Excavation LLC \$300,000 RLF RE term loan \$180,000 approved, loan documents are in process, closing 3/2023.
 - Valerie Boen (LLC TDB) \$1,000,000 SBA 504 **Borrower decided not to proceed with the building purchase.**

Other items in the pipeline include:

Work also continues two micro lending programs that we are assisting with as part of our Economic Development work. One is with the Latino Business Alliance and the other is with Marion County in the Santiam Canyon Recovery area.

We are also preparing presentations to member communities on the CPACE program, in which we would act as administrators during the application and closing process.

¹ Section 5 B of the Loan Agreement states: "...Borrower will relend the funds in the ILP Re lending Fund so that the total principal balance of loans outstanding to Eligible Small Businesses does not fall below 75% of the outstanding principal balance of the Note at any time while the Loan is outstanding."

The outstanding principal balance as of June 30, 2021, was \$738,029 of which \$553,522 should have been lent, however due the payoff the outstanding loan balance fell to \$548,257, which is 1% below the requirement of the SBA ILP's Lending Requirement.

Housing Rehab Fund Loan Activity

We have 140 outstanding loans, valued at \$2,116,779. We nave \$805,931, a decrease of \$165,488, of cash on hand for Housing Rehab Lending program dollars. The decrease in available funds are a result of loans made during the quarter, an increase of five loans.

The Colton Property

The Colton Property sale is reflected in this quarter's financials. The property sale closed in October of 2022. Proceeds are recorded at \$416,240.72 in these quarterly financials. Total USDE IRP Funds (defederalized) used for Colton were \$536,842. Of these expenses:
